Preamble

Talk is not about predatory publishing, fraud, misconduct

Fraud exists because some **scientists engage in**:

- parallel submissions
- plagiarism
- submissions to ~10'000+ predatory journals publishing >400'000 articles/yr without peer-review
- buying/ selling authorships,
- let paper mill industries submit «their» papers
- submit reviews written by AI
- spread defamations and «black lists» against respected Open Access Journals

It is the responsibility of academia to PREVENT AND STOP the use of fraudulant offers through education, regulation, policies, sanctions and... the removal of ill-defined academic incentives...





Proposal 2: Promote OPEN ACCESS – 100%

- Gold Open Access: authors (or the funders of science) pay a publishing fee (APC = Article Processing Charges). Free to read
- Diamond Open Access: no costs for authors and readers (funders of science cover all costs)

52% of PEOH publications: still beyind paywell (2024)

Proposal 3: Move "publishing funds" into Diamond & Gold Open Access - no hybrids

Doubble dipping strategy:


- Charge for subscriptions







84 publishers...

28 (33%) publish 85% of all pubs

34 (40%) were not-for-profit publishers

184 publishers

only 16 (8.7%) publish 85% of all



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

Proposal 7: Stand up against defamations targeting Gold Open Access publishers

Conspiracy-like academic circles spread defamations against Open Access journals... including the independent SSPH+ journals!

Most recent scandal:

- Finnish academic board JUFO provides Ministry of Science & Culture ranking of all journals (relevant for university funding distribution)
- As of Jan 25: PHR and IJPH got blacklisted as "suspicious Level 0" without any formal assessment ("gut feelings" of conspiracy-driven committee members)
- Revoked only in June 2025 (but only to Level 1 instead of 2 such as Eur J Pub H)
- No response nor explanation yet from JUFO nor from Finnish Ministry of Science and Culture

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Proposal 8: Call for the Editors' independence and expertise to protect QUALITY

Authors, Editors and Reviewers

= Epicentre of quality control in scientific publishing

Editors-in-chief & handling editors:

- Steer entire peer review
- Make all editorial decisions
 (desk rejections, promotion to peer review, request for revisions, assessment of reviews, final approval or rejection)
- → Expertise and ethical values of scientific editors determine quality

Two editorial models of peer-review journals

Traditional model

Decision making EDITORS are...

- leading scientists
- at independent research institutions
- experts in the field of manuscripts
- make independent decisions
- publisher has no role

Business-owned modelDecision-making EDITORS are...

- Staff hired by the publisher
- Not leading scientists
- Not necessarily experts in the field of manuscripts
- independence of decisions not guaranteed

Guidelines of the International Committee of Medical Journal Editors (updated 2024)

2. Editorial Freedom: editors-in-chief have full authority over the entire editorial content of their journal and the timing of publication of that content. Journal owners should not interfere in the evaluation, selection, scheduling, or editing of individual articles either directly or by creating an environment that strongly influences decisions.

The ill-define method and the false conclusion

- passed the Lancet Planetary Health peer review process (5 reviewers!)
- resulted in a huge global media echo
- collected >70 citations (Oct 25) featured in Web-of-Sci as a «highly cited paper»...!
- Fosters Lancet Planet H Impact Factor...(JIF 2024: 21.6)
- Misleads policies (... and funds) needed to control antimicrobial resistance

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Proposal 8: Call for the Editors' independence and expertise to protect QUALITY

Proposal 9: Stop the worship, adoration and tribute to the Journal Impact Factor

Despite the 2012 San Francisco Declaration on Research Assessment (DORA)

JIF = Journal Impact Factor


remains the toxic currency of academia

Still, no alternative standardized accessible quality indicators available (e.g.: the scientific standing of the editors...)

The JIF remains THE dominant indicator in academic assessments and decisions about publishing, reading, citing, reviewing... and shaping careers...!

The small elite world of Lancet "Global" Health

Affiliation country of first authors of 2024 articles and reviews (N=168) Clarivate Web of Science accessed 31.5.2025.





Email from author, during peer review (fall 2024)

Dear Editor,
...., your journal's impact factor has decreased to
2.6. Since our institution... can only pay fees for
journals with an impact factor of more than 3 points,
..... Therefore, we ... request the withdrawal of
the manuscript....

In conclusion.... I propose CHANGE....

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... namely to PRIORITIZE....

1) As an AUTHOR:

- Open Access Journals (no hybrids)
- ...published by Gold OA publishers (not hybrid publishers)
- ... owned by not-for-profit academic societies
- ... led by independent leading scientists (editors)
- ... that accomodate growth
- Cite not only «Impact Factor» novelty
- Engage as REVIEWER for as many articles as you co-author

2) As REVIEWER for:

- Open Access Journals (no hybrids)
- ...published by Gold OA publishers (not hybrid publishers)
- ... owned by not-for-profit academic societies
- ... led by independent leading scientists (editors)
- ... that accomodate growth
- ... while ignoring JIFactor

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2) Act as REVIEWER for:

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- ...published by Gold OA publishers (not hybrid publishers)
- ... owned by not-for-profit academic societies
- ... led by independent leading scientists (editors)
- ... that accomodate growth
- ... while ignoring JIFactor

3) as senior scientist:

- Be a role model
- Encourage the juniors to do «all of the above»

4) As an EDITOR

- Accept an editor position only in a «prioritized journal»
- Combat «quota» rules, if any
- Make solid pre-screen decision to minimize post-per-review rejection rates

5) As an academic leader

- Foster these discussions in committees, boards, etc.
- Combat ill-defined narratives («too much publishing»; blacklisting Gold OA publishers etc)
- Pressure for «free beer» also for Gold OA journals
- Combat the JIFactor addiction
