

 - Self-care



Public Health Research in our disciplines



An app-based prenatal course to facilitate access to the Swiss healthcare system for migrant families and provide them with information about pregnancy and childbirth. The app supports Ukrainian children in learning practical skills for dealing with stress and pressure by addressing topics such as nutrition, stress and exercise in a playful way.

Quality in Healthcare - Quality indicators

Falls and pressure injuries - measurement with routine data.

Evaluation quality of care for H+

The investigation of the effectiveness and costs of combined therapy (education, exercise therapy) for chronic back pain in overweight/obese individuals

Swiss Center for Care@home

The Swiss Centre for Care@home (SCC), funded by the Canton of Bern, is a competence centre for Care@home models in Switzerland.

- The BFH and lead partners collaborate to **develop innovative** @home care models.
- The SCC currently brings together **a broad alliance of 70 lead partners**, including hospitals, "Spitex" organisations, general practitioners, med-tech and health insurance companies, nursing homes and outpatient providers.
- The SCC has a threefold mission: to network, to generate knowledge and evidence, and to fund research.
- The research projects **support the piloting, implementation and evaluation of Care@home models** and serve to attract further projects.




Motivation to establish an APP

Motivation to establish an APP



- knowledge transfer between theory (academia) and practice
- access to research (research facilities) <> access to practice partners
- access to information (data, experience, literature,...)
- access to funding
- improved education/ training
 - practical experience for academic teachers <> recruiting lecturers from practice
 - practical courses for students

Promotors

- lack of time

Experiences

Wurmser et al. (2011): ...thinking strategically... strong academic– practice partnerships are increasingly viewed as crucial for the future of nursing.

Bender et al. (2019): ...over 18 years... it has evolved from an information-gathering taskforce into an Agency for Healthcare Research and Quality...

Battle (2018):... There's sufficient evidence that successful academicpractice partnerships are instrumental in improving patient outcomes and overall quality of care.

Huston et al. (2017): .. academic service partnerships must be formed at the highest managerial levels, be implemented by a joint committee of stakeholders, and be based on mutually beneficial and measurable goals
